## Unconscious woman roused by dog in time to alert help

As she lay unconscious and pleeding on her living-room loor, 21-year-old Kimberly Sanchez didn't know that her adopted dog, rescued from the streets as an abandoned puppy, was about to do something to save her life.

In the early morning hours of Sept. 28, Sanchez was unable to sleep because of abdominal pain and vomiting.
